At a recent meeting of head teachers we were asked to discuss what made our various schools different. I realized that there are many parts to our school which are unique to Melcombe and of which we should be rightly proud.

The biggest difference is that Melcombe uses a learning and teaching model which we developed ourselves over a number of years. It is hinged on the latest thinking of how children best learn and has at it's heart brain-based learning principles and ideas.

All lessons at Melcombe are taught using this model. The model ensures that lessons are taught to a very high standard and at our last Ofsted feedback meeting, the inspectors suggested that if this model is properly used, no lesson could ever be graded as less than "good". We have many head teachers and teachers from all over the country and internationally visiting the school to see our model in practice and looking to see what they can use from it to improve their own schools.

Our second difference is that we use the 'Maths Makes Sense' (MMS) approach to Numeracy. It is not a different type of Maths (as I often hear people talk about) but a different approach, which ensures children understand what they are doing rather than just having to do it. We introduced MMS quite a few years ago and it is now a firm part of Melcombe. It has had a huge impact on our school. In 2000 only 50% of children in Year 6 got Level 4 in Maths, last year we had almost every child getting Level 4 and 66% achieved Level 5.



The Student Voice at Melcombe is also an aspect of our school of which we should be proud. We have six committees which run throughout the year. At the beginning of the school year the children vote a representative from each class on to every committee and they meet once every half term.



THE Eco Warriors encourage the school community to be more eco-friendly.



THE FAIRTRADERS ensure the school community is aware of fair-trade as an issue and that we use fair-trade products at every opportunity.



INTERNATIONAL AMBASSADORS: seek to develop links with international schools.



THE JUNIOR ROAD SAFETY OFFICERS: encourage more children to walk or cycle to school.



THE RIGHTS RESPECTING GROUP: developed a school charter of children's rights and are very proactive in ensuring that the charter is supported across the school community. The school was awarded 'Rights Respecting Status' by UNICEF in 2011.



ENTERPRISERS: encourage better financial capability and economic and business understanding.

International Week


Melcombe Primary has a diverse population as can be seen by the number of children born outside the UK or who are the first generation to be born here. We know that we are in a very fortunate position and we take advantage of this. The school held a very successful International Week in January with children learning about different countries and being involved in playing instruments and learning dances from other countries. This has become a popular event and is now part of our regular calendar. We feel it is a very important week as it allows the children to discuss cultural similarities and differences, and children are given the platform to be proud of who they are and where they come from. On the Thursday evening of the week, we hold the International Evening where children put on a show and perform in front of the parents, and the parents make traditional

foods and bring these to the school to share with the other children and their parents. Both shows were sold out this year. On the last day of International Week the children wear their traditional clothes to school. This day is always a highlight of the week.

Melcombe University

In January 2013, we launched a new initiative called 'Melcombe University' that is designed to encourage children to build on their existing skills and to try new activities through a range of workshops delivered by staff and volunteers at the school.

The aim is to allow the children of all ages to receive a rich and varied experience that goes beyond the current National Curriculum. The workshop sessions are held on Friday afternoons and are intended to be not only inspirational for both the staff and children but also seek to make learning motivational and successful for all involved.



A random sample of workshops currently in progress include Craft Club, Watercolour painting, Film Club, Caring for the environment, Website building and Yoga.



Over the last few months our parent governors, led by Josefina Garcia-Mitchell and the parent class representatives have been particularly active in promoting events to support different aspects of the school. The plan now is to re-establish a Melcombe Parents' Association (or MPA) with all parents, guardians, teachers and members of staff being regarded as members unless they indicate otherwise.


The object of the Association is to:

- advance the education of the pupils at Melcombe Primary School by providing and assisting with the provision of facilities for education at the School, not normally provided by the Local Authority.
- act as a forum for parents' views and a medium for liaison and discussion between parents and the Governing Body, Head Teacher and staff of Melcombe Primary School.
- provide and/or co-ordinate practical support for the School's activities;
- arrange and/or co-ordinate social events;
- promote and foster good relations between parents; parents and staff; and parents and the School;
- do all such other things as are incidental to the above aims and objectives which enhance the good image and reputation of the School.

From the Archives

When the school was built in 1901 it was known as the Fulham Palace Road School and designed to house an infant school in the lower half of the building and a junior school in the upper half, each with it's own Head Teacher. This picture was taken in 1905 and shows pupils from the junior school.

The school was subsequently renamed Melcombe Primary when the government decided to merge 'infants' and 'juniors' to create 'primary' schools operating under one Head Teacher






